Raisin Bread Bake-off





Notable Catholics of the 1900s - Father J.B. Culemans

Name: Father John Baptist Culemans

Born: Nov. 13, 1880, on a farm near Hever, Belgium Ordained: July 12, 1904 in Louvain University, Belgium

Died: Dec. 26, 1943, in Moline Public Hospital

Notable facts: Father Culemans came to the United States following his ordination in 1904 and, just two years later, was named the founding pastor of a Moline parish for Flemish-speaking people. He guided the parish, which is dedicated to the Sacred Heart and is now one of the largest parishes in the diocese, for its first 37 years.

Known as "the flying priest", Father Culemans is also associated with aviation. Sort of a clerical Wiley Post, he began flying in 1924 and soon became chairman of the Aviation Committee of Moline Association of Commerce, and he was active in the establishment of the Moline Airport.

Among his other civic interests were the Moline City Hospital, of which was a director, and the Moline Welfare Association, which he served as president. The parish hall at Sacred Heart is named in his honor.

Getting personal: A fond admirer of the life of Abraham Lincoln, Father Culemans owned a complete library on Lincoln and was a collector of Lincoln mementos. One room in the rectory contained so many of them that it was referred to by his friends as "the Lincoln room".

He had a large garden in front of and on the west side of the original rectory. He grew many vegetables and often worked in his garden, but always with is collar on.

Was an early advocate of using corn to produce alcohol to mix with gasoline to benefit farmers and stretch oil supplies.

Two of his proudest moments were his first solo flight in 1924, and hosting Belgian Cardinal Mercier, a former instructor at Louvain, for the laying of the cornerstone of the present Sacred Heart Church in 1919. A civic holiday was declared for that occasion.

A noted writer and editor, Father Culemans helped establish Gazette von Moline, the first Flemish newspaper in the United States.

Noted for his humility, modesty, and interest in social problems, he declined the title of monsignor which had been granted to him by the pope in 1931.

Quotable: "The moment we deliberately fail to recognize and submit to a power outside of man, greater than man, the source of all that man is and aspires to be at his best, then we surrender our human dignity and personality." - Father J.B. Culemans, from an article written for the Moline Dispatch in December 1943, two weeks before his death.
