B. Frites in New York

The tasty golden fries that have made Belgium famous are available in New York at 1657 Broadway. B. Frites has a genuine Belgian frite-maker, a Rubbens fryer - Belgian-made and state-of-the art; and imported Vandemoortele mayonnaise. And, to assure the utmost authenticity, the shop has contracted with a farmer to grow an entire crop of Bintje potatoes, the ultimate potato for Belgian Fries. - Belgium Today

Recipe for Frietjes-Pommes Frites

3 to 4 cups vegetable oil for frying

2 lbs Idaho or Yukon Gold potatoes, peeled, rinsed and dried

1. Pour enough oil into a deep fryer to reach at least halfway up sides of pan, but not more than 3/4 of the way up. Heat oil to 325 degrees. 2. Cut potatoes into sticks 1/2 inch wide and 2 1/2 to 3 inches long. Dry all pieces thoroughly in clean dish towel. This will keep oil from splattering. Divide potato sticks into batches of no more than 1 cup each. Do not fry more than on batch at a time. 3. When oil has reached desired temp, fry potatoes 4 to 6 minutes per batch. They should be lightly colored, but not browned. If your fryer has a basket, simply lift out to remove the fried potatoes. Otherwise, use a long-handled skimmer to lift out potatoes. Be sure to bring temp of oil back up to 325 degrees between batches. At this point, the frietjes can rest for several hours at room temperature until you are almost ready to serve them. When ready to serve, heat oil to 375 degrees. Fry potatoes in 1 cup batches until nicely browned and crisp, about 1 to 2 minutes. Drain on fresh paper towels or brown paper bags and place in warmed serving bowl lined with more paper towels. Sprinkle with salt and serve with mayonnaise as a dip. Makes 4 to 6 servings. Note: Never cover potatoes to keep them hot, because this turns them soft and limp.
