

Bastogne: The Wood of Peace would be an interesting place to visit. The 4000 trees were planted for the 50th anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge. They were dedicated to the American veterans who fought in Ardennes, Belgian combatants and all the civilians and military who died in the winter of 1944-45. Every veteran who returned to Bastogne in 1994 chose a tree, which will always bear his name.

King Albert II is recovering well from the emergency quadruple by-pass heart surgery he underwent in mid-April. The King has resumed his protocol responsibilities and is expected to take up his full duties shortly.

Prince Philippe, accompanied by his wife, Princess Mathilde, will be visiting New York from September 9-12 on an image promotion mission. The mission is expected to draw the attention of New Yorkers to Belgian food and beverage, fashion, transportation, and high tech products.

To increase interest in this summer's Euro 2000 soccer championships, the nine spheres of the Atomium, a Brussels landmark, will be covered with fabric to resemble soccer balls. The Atomium, which represents a molecule of iron magnified 165,000 million times, was built for the 1958 World's Fair.

Recipe for Belgian Almond Cake from Diksmuide

½ cup plus 1 tbs. butter
 ½ cup plus 1 tbs. sugar
 ½ cup plus 1 tbs. peeled, roasted, chopped almonds
 ¾ cup plus 2 ¼ tbs. flour
 3 egg yolks
 3 egg whites, beaten stiff
 1 scant tbs. vanilla sugar or 1 tsp. vanilla extract

Mix butter with sugar and vanilla sugar (or vanilla extract) to a fluffy mass. Add egg yolks, one by one, then add the almonds. Continue by adding the flour and end by folding in beaten egg whites.

Butter a regular 9 inch pie pan, dust it with flour, pour in the mixture and bake in middle of oven of a preheated 355 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes, until golden.
