More travelers: August found Mr. & Mrs. Rene' Gusse touring Europe. Joining us were Rene's cousin, Achiel Dupont Jr. and his wife. First we visited Rene's aunts and uncles and cousins, the VanLandegehems (August, Robert, Nellie and their families), Eric Gusse and their families in Alter, Belgium. We were received by the Mayor of Alter, Mr. Peter DeCrem, who is a relative, by marriage. He gave us a tour of the newly constructed Administration Bldg. And also presented all with lovely gifts. The VanLandegehems and Gusse families gave us a lovely party at a local restaurant. Individual families also had dinners for us. It had been 20 years since Rene had visited his relatives. In the St. Cornelius Church in Alter, we viewed the beautiful stained glass window donated to the Church by the Gusses and Vanlandegehems. The Church had been fully restored from the bombings in World Wars one and two. Since Rene's last visit, Alter's population has risen to 18,000 people compared to the approximate 12,000 on his prior visit. Belgium is such a beautiful country and the people are very gracious and friendly. Later we went to Heule, Belgium, where the Dupont family graves are located. Rene's mother was Mary Dupont Gussse & Achiel Jr.'s father was Acheil Dupont, Sr. Mary and Achiel Sr. were sister and brother. They migrated from Belgium in 1913 and established their homes in Rock Island, on a farm where St. Pius Church now stands. The Dupont brewery, in a small town by Kortrik, Belgium, is now owned by some one else. When the Duponts owned it, it was a pub & resaurant. We also visited cities of Brugge, Ostende, Ghent & Brussels, moving on to Paris, taking tours of the city, Notre Dame for Sunday Mass, the Eiffel Tower on an evening tour. With all the lights, it was an awesome sight. There are so many things to see and do in Paris, as well as so much history. We then went to London, by Euro Rail, visiting Buckingham Palace, West Minster Abby and many beautiful historic buildings, which have been and are still being restored because of war damage. So, with sore feet, fatigue and jet lag, we returned to the U.S.A and our homes to dream of our many adventures. We hope to return someday.
