Did You Know?

Healing trees, once abundant in Belgium, are now becoming something of a national rarity, although a dozen or so remain. The sick, in an appeal to the "life force" of the trees to grant them healing, hammer nails into, or attach requests to, the bark of these symbolic trees. These practices still continue today, especially in Herchies and Stambruges, two villages between Mons and Ath. The tree is nealy 15 metres high, and its trunk is entirely covered with rags, bandages, photos, socks, stockings and even shoes. People visit the tree in the hope of obtaining a cure for warts, boils, migraines or ulcers. They rub the sick part of their body with a piece of cloth, attach the cloth to the tree and "hammer their illness" into the tree with a pail

In Memoriam


