Additions to Unesco World Heritage list

In December 2000, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization added sixty-one sites its list of cultural properties "of outstanding universal value." Among the additions were the Notre-Dame Cathedral in Tournai, the historic center of Brugge, four major town houses designed by Victor Horta in Brussels and the Neolithic flint mines at Spiennes, in Mons. The four new sites bring to eight the number of protected monuments and sites in Belgium. Already on UNESCO's list were the Flemish *beguinages*, the lifts on the Canal du Centre and the Grand Place in Brussels, all of which were added in 1998, and the belfries of Flanders and Wallonia, selected in 1999. The "world heritage sit" label implies responsibilities for the administrators of the sites and for the countries in which they are located. The common goal is, of course, their preservation for future generations.

For Your Information

Q. Is Flemish a separate language or is it a dialect of French?

A. It is another language. Flemish is the historic language of Flanders, an area consisting of the northern part of Belgium as well as parts of the Netherlands and France. One of the official languages of Belgium (spoken by more than half the residents), Flemish has some words in common with French. Flemish is the common name of Dutch as spoken and written in Belgium. Think of the variations between British English and American English and you understand the relationship between Dutch as spoken in the Netherlands vs. Belgium.


Lorensen sets retirement date

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
