# Belgian elected to top Olympic job.

In mid July, Belgian orthopedic surgeon and form Olympic yachtsman Jacques Rogge was voted eighth president of the International Olympic Committee (IOC). Rogge is the second Belgian to preside over the IOC. No other country has had two presidents.

Dubbed "Mr Clean" by the press and praised by all for his "impeccable" credentials, Rogge, 59, has been an IOC member since 1991 and has served on the executive board since 1998. He played a major role in the organization of last year's successful Sydney Olympics and was not involved in the bribery scandal surrounding Salt Lake City's bid for the 2002 Winter Games. He has vowed to step up the fight against drugs in sports and wants to downsize the Olympic games, which he considers have become too commercial.

Rogge was born in Ghent, is married and has two children, and currently lives in Deinze. He competed in the Olympic Games in 1968, 1972 and 1976 in FINN class sailing; he was world champion once and runner-up twice. He currently heads the Orthopedic Surgery Department at Ghent Hospital. He is fluent in Dutch, French, English, German and Spanish.

### Breughel at the Met

Pieter Breughel the elder (1527-1569) depicted ordinary people working, playing, relaxing, eating: Hunters in the Snow, Haymaking, Children's games, The Wedding Feast, The Skating Party are appreciated by art lovers everywhere. Breughel's splendid paintings are found in the world's most important museum. His remarkable talent is also evident in his drawings. There are only 61 known drawings by Breughel, and 54 of them – a larger number than has ever been assembled for any previous exhibition – are on view at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York from September 25 through December 2.

## O'Donohue/VandenBossche Adventure

We spent most of the month of September touring Ireland and specific areas of Belgium, Brugges and Brussels. While in Belgium, we toured the Case-New Holland plant in Zedelgem. Case/IH in East Moline, through Marlene Werbronck of Zedelgem, made arrangements. When we arrived, we were met by Frans, Moerman, who, like Gene is retired and is now a tour guide. We went into a large auditorium and the large screen projected "New Holland welcomes Mr. & Mrs. Donohue". We started in the first building, where the ideas are put on paper and ended with seeing a complete combine ready to be shipped. This took about 3 hours; Gene was taken with every moment and comparing with what we have in the states. He couldn't get over how clean the factory floor was. I thought, "but, of course, we're in Belgium!". My mental notes were of the three names on every corner of the divided areas; names like; Verstraete, Lambrecht, Coopman, /DeDecker, Dupon, VanRaes, .. the list goes on. These were the lead men for each of the three shifts.

After the tour we were invited to a reception area and told they had a special "New Holland" drink for us. This is where there is a major difference between East Moline and Zedelgem!!! As we got closer to the front of the room, there was a bar area and many Belgian beers, some whiskeys and two tall thin glasses with red on the bottom and yellow on the top. That was our "New Holland" drink, but we could have our choice. We opted to be daring. It was made of Camparri and orange juice and very tasty. There were also tidbits for snacks.

Two other men joined us. Mr. Daniel Perdu, who is retired, knew the founders of the company, and shared a bit of history with us. It was founded by Ludovicus Claeys; his daughter, Pharailde, married a Camiel Deboo. Their daughter, Margret Deboo Vanhecke, was the mother of one of our gift counter volunteers, **Georgia Vanhecke Slininger**. This was most interesting and fascinating. The other gentleman that joined us was Antoon Vermeulen, Product Evaluation Manager of the plant. We talked more combines for a bit and Gene mentioned that I was Belgian. So then, it was my turn to be verbal and somehow we got on the subject of *Lace*. My Belgian pride must have been showing, as he said I reminded him of his aunt, Joan Magee in Canada. She is very involved with the "Belgians in Ontario" and has written a book with that as the title. He gave us a copy to take home. He then said, that if I liked



lace, I should see his mother's lace. With that we accepted an invitation for the next evening to go to his home. He picked us up at the square in Brugges and off we were to the country.

Antoon's parents, Gentiel and Agness, speak no English, but welcomed us with a glass of wine. I couldn't help but notice the entire dining room table was full of lace, very beautiful lace! There was more on the buffet and pictures on the walls, a lace baby bib, framed with baby's picture in it,

their grandchild. The piece de'resitance was a blouse on a mannequin, pictured above, with Antoon and his parents. From what I understood, this and other pieces had been entered in shows and contests.

After viewing and ooohing and ahhhing, Antoon asked if we would like to see what he was interested in, as a hobby. Of course, and with that, he took us to one of three barns, one paneled (I told you we were in Belgium), to view antique carriages he restores. He travels all over to auctions and buys them, as is, and makes them look like they did when they were new. He hand carves spokes, his dad sews the leather for the seats and his mom makes lace for the tiny curtains. Every detail is perfect. On top of one was a hat box, clothing suitcase and pigeon carrier. He had one horse and that horse is used to show off the carriages in parades and other special occasions. August 15th, Brugges has a contest for the best carriage and a large parade. I believe I counted 18 carriages and he was to be off to another auction in England.
