Belgian Tidbits

Belgian Productivity:

A new study by the International Labor Organization, entitled "Key Indicators of the Labor Market 2001-2002" has ranked Belgium second in the world for productivity per worker. The report placed the United States first in the world in productivity per worker at \$54,870 in constant 1990 dollars, about \$1500 more than Belgium. By contrast, productivity per worker in the United States was \$10,000 higher than in Canada in 2000 and \$14,000 higher than in Japan. But partly because of the comparatively high number of hours that Americans work, the report found that France and Belgium edged out the U.S. in productivity per hour.

Brussels, the perfect place to be:

Real estate consultants Healey & Baker recently published their twelfth European Cities Monitor. According to this study, important factors in choosing a business location are the quality of the road system, availability of transport and telecommunications, knowledge of languages, skilled staff, price and quality of the available offices. Compared to last year's report, Brussels climbed from fifth to the fourth position.

Rock Island Historical Society: A vest with Belgian "roots"

Dr. Perlmutter donated a vest to the R. I. Historical Society along with this letter of explanation;

"During the Second World War, we were in Soy, Belgium in 1944. A group of nuns, in their gratitude for our liberating Belgium, wanted to do something for us. They suggested that if we would give them some GI Army blankets, they would make something for us. This vest is a sample of what they did with the blankets. Most of it is hand-sewn, especially the Second Armored Division emblem on the back of the vest. If you look closely, you can see the wonderful handwork that went into the making of the emblem." You can see this vest when you visit the Rock Island Historical Society.

Business Exchange Meeting.

On October 25th Patrick Van Nevel organized a business exchange meeting for Quad City area businesses. The presentation was geared to acquaint companies planning to start a manufacturing operation or new distribution channel in the European market. Twenty five attendants were very complementary of the presentations made. Following an insightful introduction by Consul General Dirk Loncke, Patrick Van Nevel, Vice President, Wells Fargo Bank Iowa discussed the economic impact of the Euro, David Ecklund, Vice President, Caterpillar Logistics Services talked about his experiences setting up the extensive Logistics operations headquartered in Flanders while Mr. Luc Fabry, Director, Business Development of the Flanders Foreign Investment Office (FFIO) detailed numerous examples of successful international manufacturing concerns with European headquarters in Flanders. Mr. Fabry also highlighted the many Flemish companies with operations in several countries.

Several attendees expressed their amazement at the wealth and resourcefulness of Flanders entrepreneurs. This presentation was a unique forum to acquaint QCA companies with what Belgium in general and Flanders in particular can offer to companies exploring opportunities in the European Union. It also allowed the Consul General Dirk Loncke and Mr. Fabry to get more familiar with the Quad Cities and learn about its business and of course the Belgian influence.
