BRUGGE 2002 FOR ART LOVERS

In 2002 Brugge will be one of the two cultural capitals of Europe. One of its greatest attractions will be a prestigious, expansive exhibition entitled Jan Van Eyck, the Flemish Primitives & South 1430-1530. The aim of this exhibition is to expose the interaction between Flemish primitives and their colleagues of Southern Europe. (1) Two other great attractions will be on the program. The Hanze Medici.com will be a summer exhibition consisting of guided discovery tour along streets, canals, small squares and historical buildings of the former commercial quarters. Original art and utility objects will be shown. Brugge's famous wooden crane will be reconstructed on the Jan Van Eyck square (2). Get To Know Our CBC Members

For everyone who hasn't met Werner yet, let me introduce you. Werner Gonnissen became a member in October 2000, only one month after transferring from Belgium to the USA for work. Although he is not a member of the CBC Board, he volunteers by doing translations, and upon Patrick Van Nevel's suggestion, designed and maintains the Center's web site, www.belgianmuseumquadcities.org, which was launched in May 2001. Werner speaks four languages (Dutch, English, French and German) and enjoys helping people in their search for information about ancestors and relatives still alive in Belgium. He says, "The gratification from seeing people smile while helping them in their quest for information is enormous."

Werner was born on June 15, 1973 to a small family residing in Dilsen-Stokkem, a small border town in northeastern Belgium, next to Holland and Germany. His family includes his parents, Jean-Pierre Gonnissen and Rachel Gonnissen-Swinnen, and two brothers, Gunter and Dieter. Following in his father's footsteps, Werner went off to college pursuing a degree in engineering, in the meantime also nourishing his thirst for languages and foreign cultures.

After graduating from Limburg University with a Masters in Engineering, Werner started his job with Oracle Corporation in Brussels, Belgium. His first well-deserved vacation from this job brought him to friends in the Quad Cities in the winter of 1998. Despite several feet of snow, he returned to this area for a couple more vacations. When Oracle offered him a transfer to the US, Werner choose Oracle Chicago's Sears Tower office as work location and the Quad Cities as his home. He works as a technical engineer for Oracle's North Central Development Services and travels throughout the US during the week. However, weekends are spent with friends in the Quad Cities. The little free time Werner has is often spent at the Center for Belgian Culture, but other weekend escapes include hiking tours or an afternoon at the golf course.

Since moving in 2000 Werner has been back to Belgium once, and plans on doing so every year. This past July his youngest brother and cousin stopped by for a visit, and in September his parents also visited with him here in the US.

Werner exclaims, "Being a first generation Belgian, I was truly amazed when I visited the Center for Belgian Culture for the first time in 2000. I was even more surprised finding out that rolle bolle and lace-making are more popular here in the US than they are in Belgium!" Werner also has made a lot of new friends by joining the Center for Belgian Culture, many of them sharing his passion for Belgian beer and chocolates. He says, "Moving from one country to another is not easy, but my friends here have made me really feel at home and continue to do so whenever I feel a little homesick."

As for the future, Werner hopes that more young people will find their way to the Center for Belgian Culture. Currently Patrick and Werner are working on a new improved version of the web site. Werner says: "The web site is only one of the many improvements implemented by our Board in the past year, and I feel hopeful that the Center will continue to grow and serve our community in the near future."
