Consul General of Belgium to the United States in the Quad Cities

On April 18 and 19, 2006, the Consul General of Belgium to the United States, Renilde Loeckx, came to visit the Belgian population in the Quad Cities. Her visit included John Deere, Caterpillar (in Peoria), The Center for Belgian Culture, and Augustana College. On the night of April 18th, she spoke eloquently at Augustana College regarding religion and the role it plays in international relations. She spoke of the religious situations in Belgium and surrounding nations, as well as the recent controversial cartoon towards the Muslim world presented by a cartoonist in Denmark.

Consul General Loeckx spoke of integrating, particularly Turkish and Arab, immigrants into society in Belgium. Part of the government's techniques is to use video tapes to show the difference in cultures. She said "every government has different techniques to integrate people into their society, we have our own as well." She said it is imperative to integrate these people into society because it is important to have new blood, young blood, and blood from different places around the world. In 10 years, she foresees Turkey being integrated into the European Union, and she is an advocate for such a move.

Consul General Loeckx was then given a reception in her honor at the Quad Cities Botanical Center in Rock Island on April 19th.

Remembering the Battle of the Bulge

A new memorial to commemorate the sacrifices and actions of the soldiers and the veterans of the Battle of the Bulge was dedicated in Arlington National Cemetery (section 21) on VE Day – Monday, May 8th. This monument is an initiative of the Association of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, which the Embassies of Belgium and Luxembourg are happy and honored to support. The dedication ceremony underscored the respect and the gratitude of the people of the government of Belgium to the valiant men and women who participated in the Battle of the Ardennes, as it is known in Belgium. What was the Battle of the Bulge?

The Ardennes Offensive (called Operation Wacht Am Rhein by the German military of the time), officially named the Battle of the Ardennes by the U.S. Army (and known to the general public as the Battle of the Bulge), started on December 16, 1944. Contrary to popular belief, it was not the last major German offensive on the Western Front during World War II; to the south Operation Nordwind began on January 1st. Wacht Am Rhein was supported by subordinate operations known as Hermann, Greif, and Wahrung. The German Armed Forces had intended to split the Allied line in half, capturing antwerp and then proceeding to sweep north to encircle and destroy four Allied armies, thus as Hitler believed, forcing the Western Allies to negotiate a peace treaty in the Axis' favour.

The "Bulge" refers to the extension of the German lines in this battle, forming a growing salient into Allied controlled territory, seen clearly in maps presented in newspapers of the time. Although ultimately unsuccessful, the Allie's slow response to the resulting gap in their lines set their timetable back to months. However, the offensive also allowed the Allies to severely deplete the cream of the German army outside the defenses of the Siegfried Line and left Germany's remaining forces in a poor state of supply, thus greatly easing the assault on Germany afterward. In numerical terms, it is the largest land battle the U.S. army has fought to date.

New Agency to Improve Medicine Competitiveness

On March 3, 2006, the Belgian Government approved a plan by Federal Minister for Public Health' and Social Affairs Rudy Demoote to create a new Federal Agency for Medications. The Agency's task will be twofold: to control the quality of medicines on the market and to speed up the registration and reimbursement schemes for new medicines in Belgium so that pharmaceutical companies in the country can continue to compete in research and production activities with foreign competitors.

If the Raad van Stadt/Conseil d-Etat advises favorably, the proposal can be approved by Parliament in time for the agency to become operational next year.

The plan is the latest in a series of steps by the Government to improve Belgium's ability to compete in the biomedical sciences. Recently a platform for dialogue with the biomedical industry was created to discuss on a regular basis new proposals in the area of public health and innovation and employment issues in the sector such as registration and reimbursement of medicines. In addition, the requirement for certain non-EU researchers to obtain work permits has been abolished, and the current reduction to include all employees with PhD's.

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Virginia Union University Renovation Project

When the 1939 World's Fair in New Year closed, Belgium was an occupied country. The Belgian government in exile decided that the Belgian Pavilion at the Fair, designed by renowned architect Henri van de Velde, would be presented as a gift to the United States.

The Pavilion had been conceived with the idea that it would be repatriated to serve as a school in Belgium, so it was not surprising that a number of American educational institutions submitted proposals for its use. After a competitive process, the Pavilion, which included a bell tower, as donated to Virginia Union University, in Richmond, a Historical Black

College/University, while the 35-bell carillon housed in the tower was given to Herbert Hoover in gratitude of his relief efforts in Belgium during and following World War I.

At VUU, the Belgian Friendship Building, as it is now called, was reconfigured for use first as a library and later as a gymnasium and a drama center. Listed on the Virginia Landmarks Register, the building is now over sixty years old and in need of restoration. Thanks to the vision and tireless efforts of Dianne Watkins, a niece of VUU's founder and first president, a campaign is underway to raise funds necessary to turn the building into a Fine Arts Center.
