
It's been said many, many times, but <u>never</u> enough. *Thank You Volunteers*, one and all!! Without you there would be no Center for Belgian Culture.

#### LAURA CORNELIS HERITAGE ESSAY

Even though my Belgian father likes to think otherwise, my Irish roots run deep in my heart and soul. My heritage is, however, a mix. I have Irish, Belgian, and Norwegian blood in me, and my family celebrates them all. From rolle bolle to wearing green, celebrating our culture is a great part of my family's joy.

My mother is very Irish and Saint Paddy's Day has always been a big day of celebration for us. Green is worn and the parade is great entertainment. The Irish flag was often flown outside my grandparents' home. It was there at my grandparents' that I first heard my grandfather humming the tune "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling." As a child, I questioned him about it. And then I questioned him further on how eyes could smile. My Grandpa Larry tried his best to explain it to me, but I did not realize the full meaning of the song until I was in high school. Part of the song reads:

For your smile is a part of the love in your heart, and it makes even sunshine more bright . . . Let us smile each chance we get.

When Irish eyes are smiling, sure 'tis like the morn in Spring.

In the lilt of Irish laughter, you can hear the angels sing. When Irish hearts are happy, all the world seems bright and gay,

And when Irish eyes are smiling, sure, they steal your heart away.

This song is a traditional part of my heritage, but it is also a philosophy of life, one that I have taken as my own. The song's message is to try one's best to be a light. Try and let your little light shine constantly, from the inside of your heart out. A twinkle of the eye and a great big smile

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are true signs of the love in your heart. Smiles and laughter seem to have an unseen power. They show one's light of love to the world!

Although I do feel very much an Irish girl, I am also Belgian and Norwegian, I learned what a rolle bolle was at a very young age. The stakes were always set up at Cornelis family gatherings. A rolle bolle has become tradition in my own immediate family as a graduation gift. My two older sisters have both received theirs. Being a senior this year, I am looking forward to my very own rolle bolle with my name engraved on it. Memorial Day has become a celebration of my Belgian heritage. Usually the whole family walks to the Belgian Culture Center for waffles. My mom makes special Belgian waffles for the family on Christmas and Easter mornings. She has also taught us how to make fattimann, a traditional Norwegian Christmas cookie. My grandmother made them with her, and now we look forward each year to making them together.

This coming fall, I will be heading off to school. While Belgian waffles and Norwegian cookies will not be possible in my dorm, I will take my heritage and traditions with

me. I am very excited about the chance to abroad as well. I have watched my sisters venture off to Europe and have only gotten to hear of the many sites and enchanting cultural experiences. I have seen pictures and have been given mementos from many countries, but I have my hopes set on Ireland. I plan to study there for a semester, but I also plan to travel to many countries, including Belgium, to see our cousins.

I will miss celebrating special heritage days with my family while I am away at school, but I will bring my heritage and traditions with me to learn and celebrate even more with others. I am rooted here, in the Quad Cities, in my family, in our cultural traditions, but I am anxious to see the world. I look forward to many opportunities to learn more about the Irish, Belgian, and Norwegian cultures, which will enable me to embrace them further.
