My Belgian heritage has greatly influenced my life. My great-grandfather, Albrick VandeWiele, came to the United States from Belgium as a young man. My dad has always told me, "Belgians know how to fix a lot of stuff because they are too cheap to pay to have it fixed." This is definitely true in my family. After someone broke into our house three years ago, my dad decided we should have a security system. Instead of paying a company to install one, my dad decided to order his own system and installed it by himself. He also set up eight security cameras that he also wired to three different televisions in our house. I'm not complaining about this frugality, since I have definitely benefited from it. When we moved into our house, the

basement was unfinished. After finding out my stepmother was expecting my little sister, I was in need of a new bedroom. In less than nine months, my dad and my grandpa designed and constructed me a downstairs suite. Their frugality and hard work gave me my own quiet place so I wouldn't have to share a bedroom with the new baby.

The Belgian work ethic is also apparent in my family's college history. Neither my Grandpa Bob nor his brothers had the opportunity to go to college. Augustana's pre-dental program allows for its students to start dental school after completing three years there. I will apply for this program after my freshman year. I am very grateful for my family's hard work. I know I will be able to achieve great things thanks to my family's positive Belgian influences.
