The group was also treated to viewing some of the Hoover Archives, which included scrapbooks about Hoover's life and a collection of embroidered flour sacks left over from the foodstuffs sent to the starving Belgians after World War I. These sacks were a gift to Hoover from the grateful citizens.

Albert H. DeGrauwe, 91, of Rock Island, died August 8, 2008, at Trinity Medical Center, Rock Island. A Mass of Christian Burial was held August 13th at St. Mary's Church, Rock Island. Burial was at National Cemetery, Arsenal Island, with American Legion Post 246 providing military honors.

Albert was born May 20, 1917, in Rock Island, the son of August and Mary Lucy VandenHeede DeGrauwe. He married Bertha Huys on January 4, 1947, in Moline. He retired from the former John Deere Plow-Planter Works in Moline. He was a World War II Army veteran.

Mr. DeGrauwe was a member of St. Mary's Catholic Church, Catholic Order of Foresters Sacred Heart Court 1691, Moline American Legion, CBC, and Deere UAW Retirees.

He was named to Academic All-State for football in 2007 and Academic All-Conference for football and baseball during each of his four years of high school. Callahan DePorter Belgian Heritage Essay

Heritage is defined as something that comes to one from one's ancestors; or tradition. My last name defines my Belgian heritage – DePorter. I am proud to be a descendant of the DePorter family and proud of my Belgian ancestry.

The earliest known ancestor on my father's side is Guellemus DePoorter. Guellemus is Latin for William. He was born in



Zwynaerde, Belgium, in 1590 and was a wagon maker by trade. Guellemus married Elizabeth Boone in 1627. Their son Pieter was born in 1628. Pieter married Barbara VanLangeraet and they had a son named Carolus in 1679. Carolus married Jeanne Thienpont and they had a son, Joannes II. Joannes married Philippina VanOverbeke and they had a son, Ivo, who was born in the year 1827. Ivo's son was Alberic DePoorter. Alberic was born in 1860 and he married Elodie Van Hecke in 1888 in Poeke, Belgium. For their honeymoon, Alberic and Elodie made their voyage to America. When they arrived at Ellis Island, the registrar wrote their surname as DePorter, with only one "o." Alberic was too frightened to correct the spelling, so today my last name is spelled DePorter. Alberic and Elodie were my grandfather's grandparents. My grandpa, Allen Joseph DePorter, was born in 1935 to George and Alice DeWaele DePorter. George was one of twelve children born to Alberic and Elodie after they arrived in the United States. Allen married Judith Anderson (of non-Belgian descent!) in 1954. My father, Jeffrey, was born in 1961. In America, with its large melting pot, it is rare to be a full-blooded Belgian - but my Grandpa Al is!

Grandpa Al instilled in me the importance of both my family name and my heritage. He has taught me to be proud of who I am, and to be proud of those that came before me. The Belgian flag waves proudly beneath the

American flag at my grandparent's home. I have been the recipient of many "Being Belgian is Beautiful" t-shirts and bumper stickers. Grandpa Al is proud of his Belgian blood and is never shy about boasting his heritage.

It is obvious that the DePorter family is proud of their ancestors. Ralph DePorter was my relative most responsible for compiling our family's history. In his travels, he constantly researched the DePorter line. It is amazing to me that we can trace our family back as far as the 1500s. Ralph was knighted by the King of Belgium in 1973 with the title, "Chevalier of the Order of the Crown" for his meritorious service to Belgium. There were two dominating professions for the DePorter family: religious and medical. The medical profession can be traced back to August DePoorter, a medical specialist from Brugge, Belgium. I hope to carry on that tradition and to also become a physician. While researching my ancestors, I learned numerous interesting facts. I also heard stories that were still "alive" and told to me by my grandparents. I was grateful to know that the stories had remained intact from generation to generation. Some day, I'll be the one responsible for telling these same stories to my children and grandchildren.

My descendants migrated to the United States from all over Western Europe: Belgium, England, Germany, Ireland, and France. If I was a dog and had to state my pedigree, I guess I would have to say I was a "mutt:" but Grandpa Al is a purebred. My last name defines me as a person of Belgian descent. I will always carry the DePorter name, and I will proudly pass down both my name and my heritage to my children some day.
