The President's Corner

Have you ever wondered why you have an interest in "something?" Like sports, traveling, acting or learning about another country? I know why I have always had a special interest in finding out as much as I can about Belgium; it was *my mother*. She always spoke of Belgium where grandpa was born, where he attended school, and other lore. She also read a column to my brother and I that was written by Marie VerBecke and published in the Moline *Dispatch* newspaper in the 1940s.

As mom read, we could follow along and pretend we were touring the countryside covered with poppies. She told us of the Grote Market, about the size of a football field covered with a flower design, and the Church of the Risen Cross, the church that perished more than once by high waters, but always the cross would float back to shore – a sure sign to rebuild and so the people did. On one of my visits to Belgium, I attended Mass at this church and took a tour, given in English. The story told by the narrator was the same story mom had told me. Needless to say, goose bumps! *Maybe, another God moment*! I also got to see the Grote Market covered in flowers, with the design being "Bobbin Lace." How fitting since I have such a love and appreciation of the lace.

When I was a child, Seventh Street was where "it was at" and the place to shop. I remember VanHulle's jewelry store, DeGreve's market, Butch Blancke's butcher shop, the Hendrickx dry good store, and of course, Goethals' clothing and shoes, the building that now houses the CBC. VanHulle's was the place for a First Communion or Confirmation gift. I loved my gold bracelet! Hedrickx dry goods was the next best thing to a candy store, as I could pick out any fabric, buttons, and trim for a new dress that mom would make. Goethals was where daddy got his dapper suits and hats of the '30s and '40s. I got those healthy, but not so feminine looking, brown lace-up shoes, but always with a clicker of Buster Brown from Art Goethals. And . . . down the street and around the bend was the Belgian church, Sacred Heart; a place of special occasions, a place to go to school, the place where I met most of my lifetime friends.

Seventh Street also had its share of taverns, but I never knew much about them. Mom said my grandpa VandenBossche would walk from Williams-White in downtown Moline, to the Pigeon Club, sip a brew, visit with his friends and walk home to 19th Street in time for dinner. I guess that's why I always had to run to keep up with his stride.

Seventh Street also had Weigant's Confectionery. I never knew how they got stuck in the middle of all the

Flanders Open House

The new Flanders House, located on the 44th floor of the New York Times building in New York City, opened on February 25th. What is Flanders House? It's a non-profit organization that consolidates all of the teams and services that work for Flanders in the U.S. Flanders Investment and Trade, Tourism Flanders-Brussels, and Flanders International will all work from the same location so they can create a more consistent image of Flanders in the U.S. and establish a single point of contact for Flanders.

Belgian Priest to be Canonized

A 19th century Belgian priest who ministered to lepers in Hawaii will be declared a saint on October 11th at the Vatican. Rev. Damien de Veuster will be canonized on that date and will be Hawaii's first Catholic saint.

In July of last year, Pope Benedict XVI approved a miracle attributed to de Veuster's intercession, declaring that a woman's recovery in 1999 from terminal lung cancer was the miracle needed for him to be made a saint.

Born Joseph de Veuster in 1840 in the village of Tremelo (Brabant), he took the name Damien and went to Hawaii in 1864 to join other missionaries of the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary. Nine years later, he began ministering to leprosy patients on Molokai, where some 8,000 people had been banished amid an epidemic of leprosy in the 1850s.

De Veuster eventually contacted the disease and died in 1889, at the age of 49.

Washington Welcomes New Belgian Ambassador

Mr. Jan Matthysen has been appointed Ambassador-designate, replacing Ambassador Dominique Struye. Matthysen will present his Letters of Credence to President Obama within the next few months, after which he will assume his full duties as Ambassador of Belgium to the United States. Ambassador Struye left Washington at the end of January to become Ambassador of Kinshasa, one of Belgium's most important postings.

Jan Matthysen joined the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1984. He started his service career as First Secretary at the Belgian Embassy in Bonn, followed by an assignment as Counselor at the Embassy in then-East Berlin. He has served as Ambassador in Belgrade, Turkey, and just prior to his posting to the US, has been Ambassador in Bangkok accredited to Thailand, Cambodia, Laos, and Burma/Myanmar.

Ambassador Matthysen graduated from the University of Ghent in 1973 with a degree in contemporary political history. He is married and has five children
