My mother's side of the family has always been so supportive of all of my scholastic, spiritual, and athletic endeavors throughout my entire life. They are the support system that a busy teen, like myself, needs. They have all been there through thick and thin. I am very close to my grandparents in particular. I have learned many things from grandmother, some of which she probably doesn't even know I picked up from her, because she naturally leads such a selfless and wonderful life; always thinking of others

before herself. She has instilled in me the importance of faith, hard work, and determination. For those reasons and many more, I wanted to look further into my heritage to see where all these wonderful people, with fantastic qualities, came from.


Both of my grandmother's parents are of Belgian decent. Her father's father came to the United States from Bassenvelde, Belgium, as a teenager. Her mother's father came as a young boy from Belgium to Canada, then to the United States. My great, great grandfather's name was Alphonse DeGreve. My other great, great grandfather's name was Rene VanderVennet, and he was married to Augusta Musslie VanderVennet. Alphonse and Madeline's son, Henry, met Rene and Augusta's daughter, Jeannette, got married, and had my grandmother, Donna DeGreve Cavins and her three brothers.

My Grandma Donna told me many interesting characteristics about both sides of those families that I can see have been passed down from generation to generation. The first would be their work ethic. Both Grandpa Alphonse DeGreve and Grandpa Rene VanderVennet ran their own stores very near to Seventh Street in Moline. Rene owned and operated a hardware store, and Alphonse had his own grocery store. They passed these hardworking and business skills to their children, Henry and Jeannette, who managed their own stores to support their family. Grandpa Hank owned a store that made wood beams for ceilings and such things, while Grandma Net owned her own Laundromat. I found a newspaper article, while digging for information, about their extremely outstanding work ethic. This definitely shows through to my Grandma Donna as well. My Grandpa and she worked very hard to support their family of seven children. This is important because it showed their children what they had to do for their families, which has shown me just how hard I have to work. I am very thankful for this and am very proud of everything my family has accomplished.

Another important aspect of my family is the Catholic faith and, more importantly, Sacred Heart Church. Grandma Donna informed me that the Belgians built Sacred Heart in the early 20th century and soon after it was finished, her grandparents Alphonse and Madeline were married in it. Generations to follow were her parents, Henry and Jeannette, Grandma Donna and her husband Jim, and my parents, Mark Wendell and Colleen Cavins Wendell. There have been numerous baptisms, first communions, and confirmations in the same church. Someday I hope to be married there as well. Sacred Heart has been the place where four generations have grown up and given so much to. I am currently sharing my voice in the Teens Love Christ Choir, every other Sunday at the eleven o'clock Mass. I also recently gave a talk at one of the Lenten Dinners on how much my family has meant to my life. Sacred Heart has not only watched me grow in years, but also in faith. It is a very important place to my family and me, and I hope it is a part of my life for many years to come.

Last but not least would be the magnificent food that the Belgian culture offers! My Great Grandpa Hank used to make blood and dry sausage and sell it in his store. Something I remember that always made me feel better when I was sick, was Grandma Net's rice pudding. I will never forget the way it smelled and the little green bowl in which it was served. Something I enjoy on Saturday mornings are the Belgian waffles that the Belgian Culture Center offers. They are so delicious! My Grandma Donna often makes raisin bread in her aluminum coffee tins for the entire family. It is so good toasted, with peanut butter and jelly. Another goodie I love but do not get very often are the famous Belgian cookies. My Uncle Dave Cavins makes them occasionally, and I'm excited that I am moving to within five miles of him next year, so hopefully I can have all the cookies I want.

I was told, since I was too young to remember when these took place, that the bicycle races on Seventh Street were always a fun time for people that share the Belgian culture. My family would go every year and practically make a holiday of it. Something else that my Uncle Joe DeGreve still loves to play is Rolle Bolle. I remember playing that in the backyard when I was too little to even pick up the bolle. Now I can manage a little bit better. One last thing that is pretty interesting is that my mom, dad and I, along with my Uncle Joe DeGreve and Aunt Pat, Uncle John DeGreve and Aunt Jan, Uncle Jim DeGreve, and my Aunt Kelly Cavins have all lived in an apartment that was owned by Great Grandpa Hank, located above his store on Seventh Street.

Mr. Beelaert was very happy with the material he was able to gather. On Sunday, he had an opportunity to tour the Quad Cities and concluded with a visit to the John Deere Commons. He was impressed with our area and the initiatives and developments. He observed, "This area does not seem to be so hugely impacted by the economic crisis as others".

H.E. Ambassador Herman Portocarero, Consul General of Belgium in New York, will be visiting the Quad Cities July 6th-7th. At this time, the itinerary is being finalized and included in his plans are visits with community and business leaders, attending the CBC waffle breakfast and the Hooverfest celebration in West Branch. West Branch, Iowa, is the birthplace of Herbert Hoover, the great humanitarian who saved Belgian children from starvation during World War I. The Belgian population sent many embroidered flower sacks to Mr. Hoover in appreciation, and several of those are on exhibit at the Herbert Hoover Presidential Library and Museum in West Branch.

Also, on August 17th, a group of 24 Belgian nursery farmers will arrive in Moline and visit the Deere Harvester Works and a local farm. We thank the Quad Cities Convention and Visitors Bureau for their assistance with arrangements.

Learning more about where we came from was such a good learning experience, as well as a ton of fun. Mmmm, Good Dip

Hot Spinach and Artichoke Dip

- 1 package (10. oz) frozen chopped spinach (thawed and squeezed dry)
- 1 package (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup Hellmann's mayonnaise
- 1-1/2 cups shredded chedder/monterey jack cheese
- 1 package Knorr vegetable recipe mix
- 1 can (14 oz) artichoke hearts, drained and chopped
- 1 can (8 oz) water chestnuts, drained and chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

Preheat oven to 350° and combine all ingredients except 1/2 cup of shredded cheese. Spoon into a 2-quart casserole, then top with remaining cheese. Bake for 35 minutes.
