

Ruth Lambrick Van Tieghem Scholarship

The Ruth Lambrick VanTieghem Scholarship is awarded to a deserving student who has completed at least two years of college and plans to continue his/her education. The \$1000 award is offered by the VanTieghem family in memory of Ruth, who valued family and the importance of a good education.

This year's recipient was Wolfe Repass of Geneseo. Wolfe is a graduate of Geneseo High School, where he maintained a grade point average of 3.7 on a 4.0 scale (and at college as well). He was a member of Key Club, National Honor Society, TEC, an



Illinois State Scholar and 3-sport athlete. He received the Kyle Braid Leadership Award for three years and was 1st Honor Roll his entire high school career. Wolfe is an accounting major at Bradley University in Peoria and is a member of its Division I men's soccer team

My DePorter Heritage by Wolfe Repass

Driving up the gravel road to my grandparents' house as a young boy, I was constantly reminded of a major part of my heritage. Blowing freely in the wind was the Belgian flag, with colors no less pure than its American counterpart that flew only feet above it. Black, my grandmother told me, represented those who had died fighting for independence; yellow symbolized grain waving in the wind; and red was a grim reminder of the bloodshed from the past. My grandfather, the last pureblood Belgian in my family, still flies those colors at his farmhouse to this day.

Although this was one of the few things I knew about my Belgian history as a young boy, I was fortunate enough to have had a man in my family who went much deeper in his pursuit of our genealogy. This man was Ralph DePorter, a Moline native during the mid-1900s, who made it his responsibility to research and compile a comprehensive DePorter history book. In 1953, the King of Belgium appointed Ralph as the Belgian Consul for 26 Illinois counties, and later, when he retired in 1973, he was knighted Chevalier of the Order of the Crown by the King for "his meritorious service to the Belgian community." Briefly, my family lineage, thanks in part to both Ralph and my grandmother Judith DePorter, is as follows.

In 1898, the first of the DePorters made their way through Ellis Island and became the initial settlers of my modern family. Alberic and Elodie, traveling on their honeymoon to the States, came from Poeke, Belgium. Circumstances, that were not made clear to me, prevented them from returning to their homeland, and thus, they remained in America for the rest of their lives. They came in as DePoorters, but when an immigration clerk failed to record the correct spelling (two Os), Alberic refrained from correcting him, and thus, the DePorter name came to be.

The name DePorter itself dates back a long time, to when Belgians were named for their trades. DePoorter means "the wagon-master," or "the gatekeeper." The gatekeeper was considered an important role in society at the time, as he was responsible for watching over and protecting the families of the community he served.

Many of my ancestors settled first in Spalding, Nebraska, where they lived in what today would be considered hostile conditions. Because of the lack of trees on the Nebraska prairie, they built homes out of "Nebraska Marble" (bricks of sun-dried soil and sod) and used "prairie coal" (buffalo chips) to heat their homes. They were farmers, and soon they moved east towards the Quad Cities area where the soil was rich, and a man named John Deere was establishing himself as a leader in agricultural innovations. Some of my early family members branched out of the farm life to pursue careers in the medical and religious professions.

Alberic and Elodie had 12 children, one of whom was George A. DePorter, my great-grandfather. George married Alice DeWaele, daughter of Jacobus and Emile Hoornaert-DeWaele, and they had eight children. George and Alice were farmers, just as Alberic and Elodie had been. The fourth child of George and Alice was my grandfather, Allen Joseph DePorter. Allen met Judith Claire Anderson while both were students at Alleman High School and they married soon after graduation. They had seven children, my mother Kathleen being the second. My mom married Rex Lee Repass, a Swiss-blooded Texan, in 1985, and they had three children, myself being the second child and only boy.

I wanted to take some time to expand on my Grandpa AI, the current Milan resident who flies the Belgian flag outside his home. When I was only two years old, my father passed away, and AI has been like a father to me ever since. He taught me about hard work, respect, discipline, and humor, to name only a few. He is 75 years of age, and only within the last year or so, when an open-heart surgery limited his mobility, has he taken any significant time off from working.

On of my favorite things to do is listen to him speak of his childhood growing up on a farm, playing sports, and trying to avoid getting in trouble with his dad George. When he heard about this scholarship I was applying for, he wanted me to put this in about Belgians: "Belgians were jovial, loquacious, goodlooking, and most of all, hard-working." Although I had to look up the word loquacious, I certainly see those traits in my current extended family today. I have endeavored to continue in the footsteps of my predecessors and will continue to work hard in whatever I do, to honor those who have come before me and to establish a bright future for those yet to come.
