UNESCO World Heritage List

The UNESCO World Heritage Committee has recognized the major mining sites of Belgium's Wallonia region as World Heritage. The four coal mining sites are Grand-Hornu, Bois-du-Luc, Bois-du-Casier, and Blegny-Mine.

The four sites offer a condensed insight into all aspects of mining heritage: expertise, landscape, remembrance, social, and architectural. They illustrate the intense migration flows that Wallonia experienced involving Flemish, Polish, Italian, Spanish, Greek, Moroccan, and Turkish workers. Among the 262 victims of the 1956 Bois-du-Cazier disaster, in which human error lead to a fire spreading throughout the entire mine, a dozen different nationalities were identified.

The mining sites represent the different stages of technology and social development. Blegny and Bois-du-Cazier represent the "work" element, while Grand-Hornu and Bois-du-Luc represent the "social" element through architecture and the workers' villages. Their inclusion in the list creates a real opportunity for the development of heritage and tourism in Wallonia.

A Local Connection

Marie's daughter Celie, married Jean-Luc DeHaene, who served as prime minister of Belgium from 1992-1999. He was able to create a coalition that became one of Belgium's most important governments, as it created the Belgian federal state.

DeHaene has written a book about his life in public service, especially his tenure as prime minister, titled *Memoires*. It's a rather large volume, 960 pages, published by Van Halewyck (ISBN: 9789461310941). The cost is 45 Euros (\$56.35 US). If you can read Dutch, this would make an interesting read. HERITAGE ESSAY by Kayla Vincent

To me, heritage is what defines a person. Who we are as individuals comes from one's heritage, one's upbringing, and one's life experiences. In October of 2010, I fulfilled one of my life goals by traveling to New York City and visiting Ellis Island. I have many Belgium ancestors who began immigrating in the early 1900's, and I have always been curious to retrace their footsteps as they entered the United States. The experience was extremely educational and gave me a better connection to my ancestors. Although I did not know many of them, I have a sense of who they are through the stories, experiences, and traditions handed down to me by my parents and grandparents. Visiting Ellis Island gave me a great understanding of the hard-life endured by many immigrants, and their dream for a better life. Ellis Island was the first step towards my ancestors becoming Americans, creating a life here, and ultimately providing me and my family with the blessings we share today.

The maternal side of my family is rich in Belgian ancestry; both my grandparents have family that immigrated from Belgium to America. One of my most memorable moments at Ellis Island was finding their names on the "Wall of Immigrants;" Cuvele, Jaecques, Maddelein to name a few. My great-grandfather, Rene Cuvele, was the last of my ancestors to be born in Belgium. He was born in 1903, in Ruysselede, Belgium, and first came to America with his parents in 1906. When he was 16 years old, he returned to Belgium with his family when his mother missed her homeland and her family. As he became of age, he declared his desire to return to the United States. Not wanting to split up the close-knit family, his parents decided they would all immigrate back a second time. On March 23, 1921, the ship called the "Finland" landed at Ellis Island and the Cuvele family again stepped foot on American soil. He became a United States citizen on September 16, 1930, married my great-grandmother in 1931, and settled in East Moline, Illinois. They had three daughters; my maternal grandmother, Theresa (Cuvele) DeSmet, was their youngest.

My grandmother has shared many memories and stories about my great-grandfather, and my mother thinks my hard work and dedication comes from him. He was a hard-worker, no matter if it was helping out on the family farm, working at Roth Packing Plant, lining up odd-jobs to earn extra money, or picking corn by hand at nearby farms. Eventually, he was able to secure a full-time job at John Deere Harvester, while only having achieved a sixth-grade education. He was a family man, and would help any person in need; he was the type that would give you the shirt of his back. These are just a few of the traits he possessed, but they are the traits I believe I inherited from him. I am a hard-worker and take great pleasure in helping others.

Prior to my experience with my high school's extended campus health occupations program, I had not realized how much other people's feelings affected me and made me feel the need to offer others some form of help. The numerous volunteer and leadership opportunities I have had, as well as the many career directed classes I have taken, have reinforced the nurturing care I hope to give to others. Discovering how much I wanted to help others aided me in my decision to become a nurse. I know that to successfully achieve my vision for the future I will have to further my education, work even harder than I did in high school, and continue to develop my skills and abilities in order to fulfill my vision of helping those in need. I never fall behind in schoolwork and I know doing well in school will lead to success in life. I take my education seriously and want the best for myself. I am caring, trustworthy, responsible, self-motivated, and dedicated. I am committed to what I do and know the responsibilities that I have and never let anyone down. When I start something I have to finish it and I never back out of a commitment. These traits define me and who I am: my heritage, my upbringing, and my life experiences.



I am now on the verge of making my vision a reality by beginning my college career at Illinois State University. I have already been accepted into the University, and in addition I have been accepted as a Freshman Early-Admit student into the College of Nursing. This scholarship will

not only help me financially in fulfilling my goal of becoming a nurse and helping others, but helps me say, "Thank You" to my parents. They have been so very supportive of me.
