

My Belgian Heritage by Lauren VanSpeybroeck

Eating my Grandma Rosalie's delicious Lukken cookies, performing with "The Happy Belgians" family band, singing at the recent Flemish Fest – all special experiences that make me think of my heritage. I know, however, that my family's Belgian roots go much deeper. I am often reminded of the sacrifices and struggles of my relatives who immigrated to the United States when I look



on my living room wall. Hanging there is a framed copy of the Ellis Island manifests and photograph of the ship on which my great-great grandfather travelled to the United States. There I can see the handwritten document with the name, Rene VanSpeybroeck, dated 1902. It states that he arrived in America with only \$25 in his pocket. Rene travelled alone ahead of his family to prepare their way. He later returned to Belgium to bring back his wife and children to America and then started a business in downtown East Moline- "Speybroeck's" Clothing Store.

Five years ago, I visited Ellis Island. It was so surreal to enter the same room, stand in the exact spot Rene stepped off the S.S. Haverford. I couldn't even imagine landing in a foreign country alone, not knowing the language, nor how I would survive – but I am so happy that my great-great grandpa took that leap of faith. Because he came here to America, I exist, and can help out others just like Rene who came here to start anew.

The past two years, I volunteered for Casa Guanajuato's programs, "Hola, Que Tal?" and "Si, Podemos." Female immigrants from Spanish-speaking countries attended "Si, Podemos" to make friends, acquire job skills, obtain health insurance, and learn to succeed here in the U.S. While the women were

involved in this program, I engaged their children in educational activities to keep them in touch with their heritage even while not in their native country. It was not only a learning experience for them but for me as well.

This fall I will attend University of Northern Iowa to major in TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages) and Spanish Teaching with a Theatre minor. My dream job is to combine my enthusiasm for languages and my love of theatre to teach in a high school and direct the school productions.

I am continually seeking to learn more about my career path, so I recently attended an ESL (English as a Second Language) Conference at Western Illinois University. The sessions were led by ESL and ELL (English Language Learners) teachers who shared their knowledge and experiences. I learned about other cultures, how they're different from my own, how to be sensitive to those with different customs, how best to teach English to new learners, and what to expect in my future career. When I graduate, I will assist immigrants in learning English so they can thrive in this country just as much as could any native speaker. A beacon of hope for immigrants all over the globe, we, as Americans, are expected to be welcoming to those in need of a new place to call home. That's why I want to be there for any immigrant, like my great-great grandfather, who wants to come here to the United States for a fresh start.

Rather than a "melting pot," I prefer the analogy which compares America to a beautiful mosaic – separate and unique, like the tiles, but one masterpiece. We retain our cultural identities but are a unified people. As a Belgian American, I am proud to be a part of that colorful work of art that is the United States of America.

Despite numerous changes in management over hundreds of years, the original horn logo has not changed. The same horn that once beckoned travelers in Belgium is still featured in the current Stella Artois brand.
