Queen Fabiola Dies

Queen Fabiola, widow of King Baudouin, died at Stuyvenberg castle in Brussels on December 5th. She was 89 years old. Her funeral was held on December 12th.



Fabiola de Mora y Aragon was born in Madrid in 1928, the daughter

of nobility. She married Baudouin in 1960 after he had been on the throne for nine years. The couple was childless, and when Baudouin died in 1993, the throne passed to his younger brother Albert.

Fabiola then moved out of the royal palace in Laken to move nearby Stuyvenberg, where both Baudouin and Albert had been born. She lived quietly, out of the public eye so as not to overshadow the new royal couple. One exception was her annual appearance at the Queen Elizabeth Music Competition, which she continued to patronize.

The former queen's health declined over the last few years, particularly after a respiratory infection in 2009, from which she never fully recovered. She was last seen in public in the summer of 2013 at a remembrance ceremony for her husband.

Her estate will go to the non-profit Hulpfonds van de Koningin (Queen's Aid Fund), which was set up upon her marriage to collect funds to aid the needy and to finance projects that aim to improve opportunities of young people and their families.

Belgium and Its Fries

There's one thing that unites Belgians, who have long been divided on linguistic lines, and Belgium wants to hold on to it. The country wants to get Belgian potato fries recognized as global cultural heritage and have it put on equal footing with the Peking opera and the Argentinian tango. And it may get unequivocal support.



To become recognized by the United Nations' cultural arm UNESCO, the fries need to be endorsed by a minister of culture, and Belgium has three of them. UNESCO has a list of 314 items of intangible cultural heritage worthy of preservation, ranging from Turkish coffee to the polyphonic singing of the Aka pygmies of the Central African Republic.

Although they're associated by name with its neighbors to the southwest, Belgians claim ownership of the French-fried potato. The starch reached Belgium in the 16th century, but it was not until the 19th century that they were widely sold chipped and fried as a meal in themselves. Trade organization UNAFRI says 95% of Belgians visit a fritkot – a shack or trailer selling fries – at least once a year.

Belgium is the best performing country when it comes to women's rights, according to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). The Social Institution and Gender Index looks at 14 indicators in five sectors in 160 countries, including matters such as violence against women, civil rights, and age of consent in marriage.

The OECD stated that Belgium guarantees the rights of women within the family, protects women against violence, offers equal access to resources, and grants women equal civil and political rights.

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It Seems We're Not Alone

No doubt you remember the uproar over America's spying on its European friends when Wikileaks published the documents stolen by Edward Snowden. It turns out that the U.S. isn't the only country spying on its allies.

Espionage by the British intelligence service GCHQ into Belgacom's telecommunications network was more extensive than previously thought, according

to documents revealed by *De Standaard* and the Dutch newspaper *NRC Handelsblad*.

In September last year, the German magazine *Der Spiegel* reported, based on documents leaked by Edward Snowden, that GCHQ operatives had hacked the computers of Belgacom employees, gaining access to Belgacom's network, as well as to Belgacom International Carrier Services, the subsidiary that provides phone and internet traffic in Africa and the Middle East.

The new revelations show that the initial hacking – codenamed Operation Socialist – took place before June



2011 and was much more extensive than Belgacom has admitted. Contrary to previous claims, the hacking gave GCHQ access to virtually every mobile number in Europe, the Middle East and Africa. It wasn't just private clients of Belgacom who were under surveillance, but also the telephone networks of NATO and the EU in Brussels, as well as international delegations and embassies.

Belgacom declined comment, but the British government said the GCHQ's operations were "essential, legal, and proportional."

Snowden told *De Standaard*, "This is the first time that there has been 'smoking gun' evidence of a cyber-attack carried out by one country against the critical infrastructure of another. This example is breathtaking and shows the scale of state-sponsored hacking."
