# **Older Generations Can Capture the Younger Generations:**

A personal essay about friendship, regardless of age, and how that inspired me to become an active member in the Center for Belgian Culture

The following month, my husband and I volunteered to work the waffle breakfast. I was a broke college student, so I was all about earning a free breakfast! When the crowd died down, Celie and I met at the gift counter. She pulled out her yearbook and let me flip through it. She showed me pictures of Bonnie (my namesake) and of my grandmother, Janette VandeVelde. I can't explain how much that gesture meant to me.

Over the next year or so, my husband and I volunteered at most of the monthly waffle breakfast gatherings. The more we volunteered, the more we got to know Celie and Gene Donohue, and various key volunteers of the Center of Belgian Culture. Slowly the members of the CBC became like family to me.

Celie was the President of the center at the time, and she started to prepare the center to transition to the next generation. She recruited several new board members, and one of those members was me. Celie was still very active within the board and the Center, but was more interested in grooming the next generation to take over.

My first go sitting on the CBC Board was interesting, and we experienced several obstacles that tested all of our commitment to the Center's survival. Deciding to move, where to move to, and how we were going to do all of this with dwindling interest in membership. There were several heated discussions and the board was truly divided on what to do.

It was during this time that Celie and I really forged our friendship. We talked at least once a week about different strategies to keep the Center alive, and through our shared love of our Belgian heritage our friendship really turned into a mentorship. I grew to admire Celie's determination and her fierce spirit.

I ended up stepping away from the CBC board in 2013, as my career started to grow. So I missed out on a lot of the big changes. I think shortly after the Center moved to its new location, the entire Quad Cities found out that the Belgian Village Inn was closing. I immediately called Celie to see if she and Gene wanted to meet Jason and me to try and get one last VandeRuben.

We all met at the Belgian Village Inn after work around 4:30 p.m. We somehow found a place at the bar to bunker down. You couldn't even move it was so busy! The remaining

staff was running around like crazy trying to serve people drinks and appetizers, but the staff was uncertain if there would be any more VandeRubens. Our sentiment was, "What the hell? Might as well stay for one last drink and hope for the best."

Last year, I'd found out Celie had gotten sick. We hadn't talked as much since I'd gotten so busy with life outside the Center. We chatted a few times on the phone, but I didn't get to visit her before she passed. I feel she wanted it that way. She wanted me to remember that fierce, vibrant woman that she was.

I can tell you that during our last conversation, Celie was in a bit of a fog. Well, at least until I told her I was going to join the CBC board again. Once she heard that, it was like Celie was back to her vibrant self. She said, "That's the best news I have had in a long time."

For me, volunteering for the CBC is the best way that I can honor Celie's memory. Her dedication to The Center's survival is something to be admired.

This is the impact that the older generation can have on the younger generation. It doesn't take much to enjoy sharing a passion with a younger person. I encourage all of you to reach out to someone that you know and forge a friendship. You'll likely never get to know the true and lasting impact your stories and knowledge can have on a young person.

The Center for Belgian Culture will be working towards educational dinner programs that will be a perfect bonding opportunity for the older and younger generations to come together and discover or rediscover our heritage. The Kusttram (Coast Tram) connects Knokke with DePanne and is the longest tram in the world, traveling through ten coastal communities. Three million people visit the coast annually.
