Pipe Dream Becomes Reality

Xavier Vanneste had a problem. His centuries-old brewery, De Halve Maan (The Half Moon) was the last brewery remaining in the center of Bruges. His bottling plant had been moved to an industrial park about two miles away, and the brewery truck fleet had been tying up the city's narrow, cobblestone streets on the way to the bottling plant.

The city of Bruges, which draws over six million visitors a year, has for years been looking for ways to reduce traffic in its historic center – a Unesco World Heritage site known for its canals and medieval architecture.

While watching workers laying underground cables in front of his house, Vanneste suddenly discovered a solution: pipe the brew to the bottling plant. And now, four years after that epiphany, the pipeline is nearly complete. It will be able to carry 1,500 gallons of beer an hour at 12 miles per hour. Hundreds of truck trips a year will no longer be necessary.

Shortly after the pipeline was announced, many locals dreamed of siphoning off personal supplies of the beer. Vanneste stated that it would be impossible to illegally tap into the polyethylene tubes, as they are stronger than steel.

The investment by De Halve Maan is \$4.5 million, but \$325,000 was raised by private individuals. Those individuals received lifetime supplies of beer. There were even investors in the U.S., as the beer has a following here. Last year, the brewery exported nearly 5,250 gallons of its most popular brews, Bruges Zot and Straffe Hendrik, to the States.

According to Vanneste, the new pipeline won't affect the taste of his award-winning beers. Most of the pipe runs about six feet underground, but in some spots, it's nearly 100 feet under.

A Great Market

Brussels' Grote Market has been voted the 13th world site worth seeing by TripAdvisor. The square is featured in the Travelers' Choice Awards for sightseeing, ahead of the Eiffel Tower, The Great Wall of China, and the Acropolis. The list is topped by Machu Picchu in Peru and the Sheikh Zayed mosque in Abu Dhabi.





Over 600,000 begonias are assembled by 100+ volunteers in just four hours for the Grote Market flower carpet. The plaza has been adorned every two years since 1986.

Rewriting History?

The "right to be forgotten," which allows members of the public to have references to their private life removed from internet searches, also extends to newspaper archives, the Belgian Cassation Court has ruled.

The court was ruling on an appeal by Rossel, the publishers of Le Soir newspaper. Rossel had been sued by a member of the public who had been involved in a traffic accident in the past, and who demanded that all reference to the matter be expunged from the paper's archives.

He won his case in the lower court, and Rossel appealed and lost. The last-resort appeal to the Cassation Court also failed, as the court ruled that the right to be digitally forgotten formed part of the constitutionally guaranteed right to be left in peace in one's private life.

By basing its arguments on an interpretation of the Belgian constitution, the court avoids reference to the European law that extens the right to be forgotten to the whole EU. The Rossel group said it regretted the ruling, which it said "opens the door to the rewriting of history."

As the author of four local-history books, your newsletter editor feels the same; it could lead to rewriting or eliminating history all together.

Insuring Good Chocolate

Researchers at the University of Leuven have developed a new technique that makes it possible to check the quality of chocolate via ultrasound imaging technology, and was developed to assist companies in the chocolate sector.

The project can determine if the cacao butter in the chocolate is properly crystallized through the reflection of ultrasonic waves. Five sorts of crystals can be formed during this process, but only one of them leads to quality chocolate. The number, size and shape of the crystals, and the way they stick together are also important.

Currently, checking the quality of chocolate is a timeconsuming process involving samples from the production lines being analyzed in a lab. Quick adjustments are impossible, which can lead to a large quantity of chocolate being destroyed or re-processed. The new technique checks the chocolate during production.

Researchers are now working to turn the lab prototype into commercial equipment available to the chocolate manufacturing world.
