MY HERITAGE by Gabrielle Lenger

Young adult author Patricia Briggs once said, "Identity was partly heritage, partly upbringing, but mostly the choices you make in your life." Heritage plays a large role in my life by giving me a sense of purpose and achievement. Now looking in my father's 650-page genealogy book, I can see how far our family and civilization have progressed.



On my father's side of the family, my fifth great-grandfather Charles Kemble,

was born in England and christened in St. Sampson Church in Cricklade, Wiltshire, in 1798. In 1846, he immigrated to Trumbull County, Ohio, was married and later moved to Illinois as a farmer. His son, Samuel Kemble, was born in 1850 and had three older brothers; Thomas, Chauncey, and Anthony, who served in the Civil War for the North. From then on, my father's side of the family has lived in Illinois.

On my mother's side of the family, my fourth great-grand father, James Grubbs, also came from England and moved to America in the late 1700s and settled in Virginia. His son,

Nathan Grubbs, moved to Texas in the mid-1800s. My other third great-grandfather, Henry Jones, born in 1839, fought in the Civil War on the Confederate side. While researching Henry, my mother told me an interesting story about him in the war. He was captured and successfully escaped, but while escaping, he was shot in the foot. It is interesting that my family served on opposing sides in the Civil War. I would like to do more research in military service to find out how close they actually served to each other. Texas is where most of my mother's side of the family currently resides today.

Military service has been important to my family. My grand-father on my mother's side, Harold, served in World War II in South America. I did not realize there were any military bases there until my grandfather told me many stories. My grand father on my father's side, Don Lenger, served in the Navy during the Korean War. He was the first person on his side of the family to graduate college. He taught in the Moline School District for over thirty years. He encouraged my father to attend college, and in turn my father and mother have encouraged me to attend college to pursue activities that interest me and will make me a productive member of society.

My father met my mother when he was working in Texas, and they moved to Illinois in 1995. It is very interesting how two families from England, one settling in Illinois and one in Texas, can eventually meet and create a new family. Although I have two genealogy books, I still have many gaps in my family history. When I have more time in the future, I would like to pursue more research of my family. I would like to get into more personal stories, rather than just facts and figures. Hearing more stories from my distant family would bring these facts to life.

Belgian Professor Honored

Ghent University professor Wilfried De Neve, a pioneer in radiotherapy, has been awarded Honorary Membership by the American Association of Physicists in Medicine for "distinguished service" in developing radiation treatments with fewer side effects.

According to the organization, it's because of researchers like De Neve that radiation continues to be a viable treatment next to chemotherapy and surgery. His work has contributed greatly to limiting the therapy's negative effects on healthy tissue.

De Neve also succeeded in dramatically lowering the acute toxicity in breast cancer patients and lowering the risk of these patients getting lung cancer or heart failure as a consequence of radiotherapy.

Unique Artist Passes

Toots Thielemans, one of the world's most famous jazz harmonica players, has died at the age of 94. He was being cared for in hospital after suffering a fall last month and died in his sleep.

Jean-Baptiste Thielemans was born in 1922 in the Marollen neighborhood of Brussels. He was a self-taught guitar player and joined in Paris sessions with Charlie Parker, Miles Davis, and later toured with Benny Goodman.

He established himself as one of the world's best harmonica players – harder to come by than a guitarist – and recorded with everyone from Ella Fitzgerald to Billy Joel. He was also known as whistler, and his biggest solo hit "Bluesette" featured him doing both.

His harmonica playing was featured on numerous film soundtracks, most notably *Midnight Cowboy*. He also played in the closing credits of *Sesame Street*.

For all of his fame, Thielemans remained close to his community – referring to himself as a ketje, born-and-bred Brussels folk. He was given honorary doctorates by both city universities and was named a baron by Albert II
