The Belgian Ambassador to the United States, Dirk Wouters, spent three days visiting the Quad City area. He visited businesses here and in Iowa City, the Hoover Library and Museum at West Branch, spoke at both St. Ambrose University and before the QC Chamber of Commerce, visited the CBC, and attended our monthly waffle breakfast. Some of the Center's board and volunteers were also able to meet with the ambassador at two receptions.

Ambassador Wouters has been Chief of Staff to the Minister of Foreign Affairs and was one of the architects of the Belgian

Legacy, Letters and Lace

The National Air and Space Museum posted an interesting video on its website as part of an educational program called STEM in 30. The video is called World War I: Legacy, Letters and Lace. The program looks at advances in aviation during the war.

But what might interest you the most, is a segment looking at the Belgian Ambassador's residence in Washington, D.C. featuring Ambassador Dirk Wouters' wife Katrin, and another segment with Ambassador Wouters.

You will also hear some letters written by Belgian school children on how they were affected by the German occupation of their country, see examples of trench art, and learn how lace makers helped feed a nation. The curator of the Air and Space museum also answers school children's questions about aviation during WWI.

Once you get past the introductory few minutes, you will find it an interesting program. The entire video lasts about 28 minutes. Here's the link:

Here's An Idea

As many of you know, due to our former landlord's financial issues several years ago, we were forced to move to a new location. That move has nearly tripled our rent. Commercial real estate rates are not cheap. On the plus side, we have a nicer facility for showcasing our Belgian heritage, and by utilizing the Friends Circle, we have a better facility for our waffle breakfasts.

The monthly waffle breakfasts help pay our rent. Dues help pay for our newsletter, our insurance, and our utilities. The Birdies for Charity program pays for our scholarships.

Your board has been looking at ways to meet our monthly expenses. With declining membership through attrition and lack of new members, positive cash flow is tough to come by. One idea that would help us is sponsorships of the breakfasts and the newsletters. Would members be willing to help underwrite a breakfast or a newsletter to allow us to cover the cost of those two items? That would help provide some extra money to allow us programming possibilities.

A sponsorship for a waffle breakfast would be \$300 and a newsletter would be \$150. Appropriate acknowledgement would be provided at the breakfast and in the newsletter, and a sponsorship would be tax deductible.

Best Flemish Dutch Teacher

For the first time, a Flemish teacher has won the competition organized by Dutch public radio to find the best Dutch-language teacher. What makes Tamara Stojákovic's achievement all the more remarkable is the fact that she came to Flanders at the age of 11, as a refugee from the civil war in Bosnia. She currently teaches in a suburb of Antwerp.

Tamara told VRT News, "When I first came to Belgium, I couldn't speak a word of Dutch. There were no classes for non-Dutch-speaking children, so I was dropped into a normal primary school class. It was very difficult, but by reading a lot of Dutch-language books, my Dutch got better and better. It's a difficult language, as I now realize since I teach it."

Tamara has been teaching for seven years and happily stated about the award that "words and punctuation marks fail me."

If you call someone a Smurf, you could be in trouble. Not from the creator of the cartoon character, but from the federal police in Belgium.

A man was pulled over twice on the same day on the Brussels Ring by traffic police. During the stop, the man took photos of the officers and posted them on Facebook, describing the officers – who are admittedly blue in appearance – as Smurfs.

The post led to legal action and the man received a suspended sentence and a fine of \$1500. He appealed, saying the name-calling didn't meet the definitions of cyber-harassment. The officers insist their rights had been violated.

Caroline's video won the regional documentary National History Day event in Milwaukee, was first runner-up at the Wisconsin State History Day Competition, and was awarded the State Archival Award for her filmmaking efforts. In addition, her classmates voted her the honor of placing a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Washington.
