Belgian Dinner



Belgian Mayor for Nolo?

Brussels-born Patrick Van Hoorebeek hopes to become the first ever Belgian to become mayor of an American city. The 63-year old wine bar owner is a candidate for the mayoral election being held on October 14th.

Van Hoorebeck left Brussels in 1985 to visit his father who left Belgium 20 years earlier. However, he never returned and has been living in the U.S. for the past 32 years. He wound up in New Orleans where he opened a wine bar, the Bar Vin, in the French Quarter. That was his dream come true. Now he wants to realize another dream: to become mayor of his adopted home city.

He is running as an independent candidate and knows it will be difficult. He only has a little over \$10,000 to spend on the

campaign, which has the slogan "More Wine, Less Crime." He states, "If people don't feel safe, they won't want to come and drink wine at my bar." He wants more cameras and police on the streets.

Just maybe he will strike a chord.



CBC Scholar Recipient

This month's essay is by scholarship recipient Arden Brewer of Overland Park, Kansas. Arden attended Blue Valley West High School where she was active in athletics and was involved in 15 theatre productions, including lead and supporting roles, set building, and sound. She was a member of National Honors Society; the National Math Honors Society; National Art Honors Society; and the National English Honors Society. Arden is attending Washington University in St. Louis, and will major in Molecular Biology and Political Science.

MY HERITAGE by Arden Brewer

In eighth grade, our English teacher asked us to write a biographical novel about a member of our family. I was determined that in writing this biography I would discover something groundbreaking, some unique part of my familial history that would impress my family. What I received instead was an insight into my heritage: an explanation for my family's hard working, take nothing for granted behavior.



My searches resulted in my deciding to write about my Great Grandma Fleischman. She had passed away six months after my birth, so I never truly got the chance to get to know her. I vaguely knew of her, mainly that she had immigrated here from Belgium in the early 1900s. Eager to learn more, I began my research interviewing my Grandma Lorenson and Great Aunt Therese, her daughters, and searching online for news of the Boens family (her maiden name) in Belgium. What I found out was a past filled with hard work, pain, and love.

Great Grandma Fleischman immigrated to America at the age of seven, but even living just seven years in Belgium colored her life with that culture. She brought with her faith, her affinity for homemade foods filled with love, and her deep-rooted respect for her heritage. Her immigration was not an easy process. She had five other siblings, so the trip through Ellis Island was colored with the fear one of them would be denied entry. This ominous possibility almost came to fruition due to my Great Grandma's poor eyesight; she was held back and almost sent home, yet finally made it through. When her family finally arrived in the land of opportunity, they by no means had it easy. Her father and older brother worked in a brickyard, and her other older siblings also got jobs to help the family stay afloat. She was only able to attend school through 8th grade, at which point she dropped out

and became a live-in housemaid, assisting the cook and watching the children, only returning home on weekends.

What I found utterly shocked me. The hardships and pain I had only read of immigrants enduring in my history classes became a reality. I was overwhelmed by the pride I felt in my family for overcoming obstacles, taking advantage of every opportunity they received, and making something of themselves. This acquired information completed the puzzle as to why my family was so hardworking, so driven; they knew better than to take what they had for granted.

I was spurred to implement this mindset in my own life. It became evident in high school that this ideology would be part of what defined me. Determined to take the hardest classes, to constantly push myself and to dream big while doing it, I now make the most of opportunities I am lucky enough to be presented with. It has also allowed me to recognize traits in the actions of my grandma and mom, reminiscent of our heritage. Both are strong women who worked hard for everything they have. Both are also filled with love and pride and the ability, which has to be hereditary, to make the perfect coffee cake (Great Grandma's recipe). Since writing this book, I have a newfound appreciation when my grandma takes me to visit the cultural center; it is no longer "grandma's place she likes to go" in my head, it is a celebration of the heritage that made each of us who we are.

My Belgian heritage is a heritage of strength and endurance. It is a heritage of not settling for the current circumstances, but wanting better. It is a heritage of warm coffee cake (filled with love) on Christmas morning and the religion that fortifies me. It has only been three generations since my Great Grandmother's immigration, since she endured hardships to enter this nation and even more to stay afloat in it. It has been three generations since she dropped out of the 8th grade to work full time, and I am writing this essay today for a scholarship to aid in my attending college.
