Belgium Takes Third

Just in case you hadn't heard, Belgium took third place honors in this year's FIFA World Cup finals. The Red Devils beat England 2-0. Added to that, team goalkeeper Thibaut Courtois was awarded the Golden Glove Award as best goalkeeper at this year's World Cup. For many of us, this was the first year we followed the World Cup from start to finish. And what a finish the Belgian National Team gave us. Congratulations!

Hill 80

An archaeological project in Flanders' Westhoek area has delivered more than expected. Excavations on a ridge known as Hill 80 started last March. A mill was originally on the site, but was occupied by Germans and turned into a fortification in 1914. It proved to be an effective defense; it wasn't breached until 1917 in the Battle of Messines.

The site, which has remained untouched since the First World War, is being turned into a new residential project. But Simon Verdegem, an archaeologist, didn't like the idea of the area's development before being excavated. He began a crowd-funding campaign, which brought in over \$208 million, providing enough for a 60-day dig.

So far, archaeologists and volunteer amateurs have found an estimated 128 bodies of soldiers and more than 1,500 objects. There are also fully intact cellars that were part of the original mill. Items found were things associated with the mill from before the war, and items that date from the beginning of the war.



Bayonets, helmets, and uniform buttons provide clues to many of the dead being French, English, and German soldiers. Discovery of several trenches and the items found there indicated a German mass grave. Fully intact cellars that were part of the original mill were also discovered.

Beer

Did you know that Belgium has 261 breweries and that 60% of the beer Belgium produces is exported? The biggest drinkers of Belgian beer are France, the U.S., and the Netherlands. The main styles of Belgian beer are lambics, white beers, fruit beers, Trappist and abbey beers. Let's look at the Trappist beers.

Trappist monks have been making beer since monasteries began, but the Trappist beer tradition only dates back to 1997, when eight abbeys – six from Belgium, one from the Netherlands, and one from Germany – formed the International Trappist Association. There are three rules for being recognized as a Trappist beer, and they are strictly enforced: the beer must by brewed within the confines of a Trappist monastery under the supervision of monks; the brewery must fit into the order's philosophy of combining the life of prayer with a life of work; and income must be re-invested in the monastery and the monk's charitable/pastoral work.

The two best-known Trappist beers of Flanders are Westvleteren and Westmalle. Westvleteren is brewed by 12 monks of the Sint-Sixtus abbey and is regularly voted the best beer in the world. They don't make a lot and it's not easy to get. You have to order ahead and pay a deposit on every bottle and the crate.

Westmalle is brewed at Our Lady of the Sacred Heart abbey. It is more commercial minded, and their lightly hoppy, fruity tripel is a staple in most bars. One also worth enjoying is their



dubbel. It's dark, warm, and slightly spicy. It's one of Belgium's most popular beers.
